It is estimated to be over 70 years old and now faithfully anchors Furman University Way at Falls Park. The Furman Arboretum was established in 1932 with a \$500 prize won by the Greenville Garden Club. It became the first arboretum in South Carolina and is thought to be one of the most photographed trees in the state.
