Teagle Foundation, Princeton Review cite Furman

Furman is among a select group of liberal arts colleges and universities recently recognized by the Teagle Foundation for having achieved "exceptional results with limited resources."

The findings are based on a study of colleges by professors Roger Kaufman of Smith College and Geoffrey Woglom of Amherst College. After examining such factors as graduation rates, Ph.D. production and expenditures per student, the foundation identified 12 private liberal arts colleges that have made the most of their financial resources.

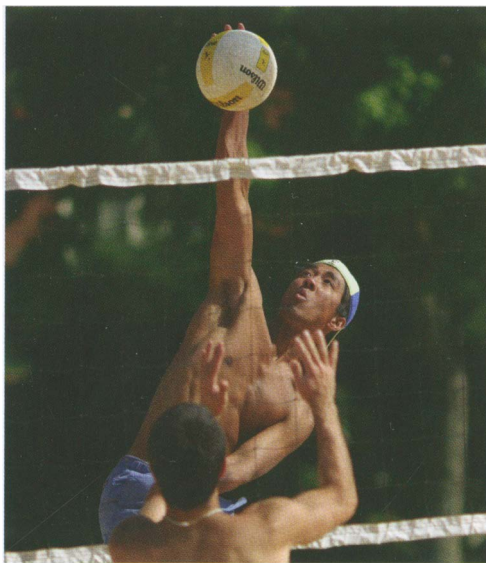
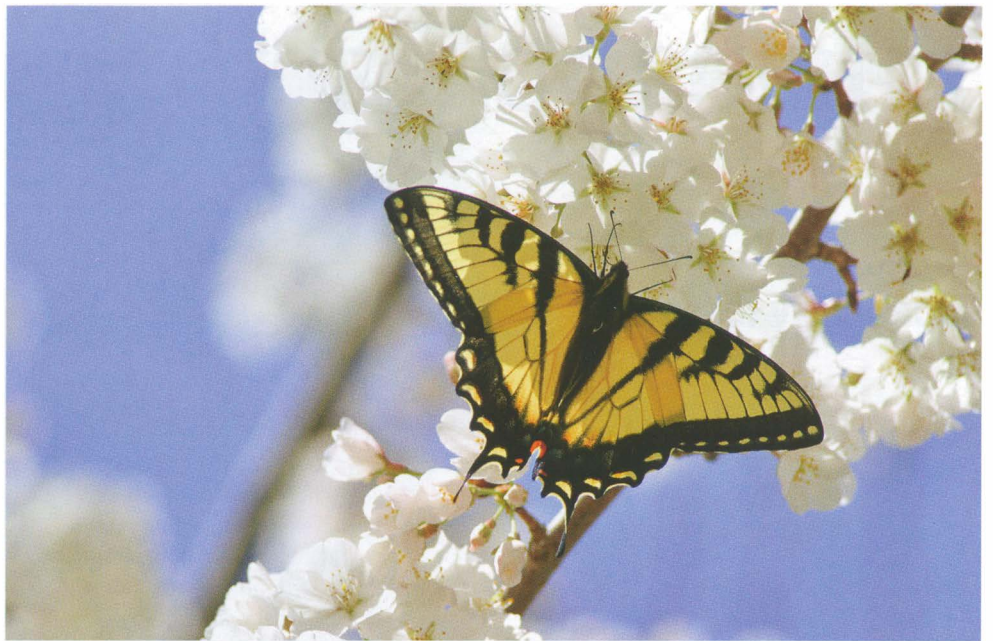
"The question that most interested me was not how much money these colleges had but what they were achieving with it," wrote Teagle Foundation president W. Robert Connor in the report.

The study was restricted to the nation's top 105 national liberal arts colleges as ranked by *U.S. News & World Report*. Wofford College, Furman's neighbor in Spartanburg, S.C., was also on the list, as were Augustana and Knox in Illinois, Austin (Texas), Barnard (New York), Bennington (Vermont), Juniata (Pennsylvania), Luther (Iowa), St. John's and St. Olaf (both Minnesota), and Thomas Aquinas (California).

Furman and Wofford are also included in the latest edition of *America's Best Value Colleges*, a Princeton Review guidebook.

The 2006 edition features 81 public and private schools from 35 states, chosen on the basis of outstanding academics, generous financial aid packages and relatively low costs. The selections were made based on data provided by more than 350 institutions, plus surveys of students at the schools.
