A helping hand for young alums

The Young Alumni Council strives to assist and support Furman by:

About the time this issue of *Furman* magazine hit the mail, another 600 students received their diplomas and joined the expanding family of Furman alumni, now 26,000 strong.

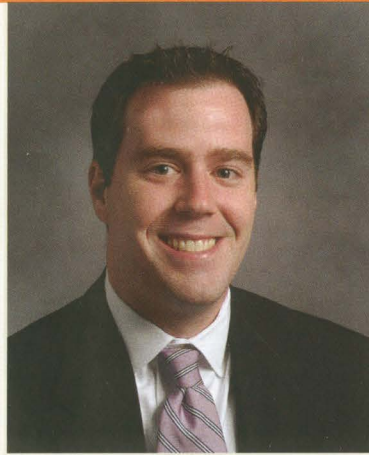
These new graduates face the challenge of staying connected to alma mater while getting used to new cities, new jobs and new friends. The Young Alumni Council can help them.

The council represents the concerns of young alumni — graduates of the last 15 years — to the Furman administration. In doing so, it offers them a way to maintain ties to Furman and have a voice in university affairs.

The council has 30 members, each of whom serves for three years. The group meets three times per year, or once each academic term. The fall meeting is typically held during Family Weekend, and the spring meeting usually coincides with Founders Week.

Council committees meet more regularly and are responsible for developing activities designed to maintain an open relationship between alumni, the administration and current students. The committees focus primarily on four areas: young alumni interaction, student interaction, development and marketing.

While the Young Alumni Council's most visible event is the Family Weekend Fun Run, the group organizes other programs throughout the year. For example, we initiated a networking event for alumni and Furman seniors,



offering them the chance to mix and mingle in a casual, informal setting. The program is beneficial for the students and alumni alike. The council is also a major sponsor of the year-end senior picnic.

One of the most rewarding aspects of being involved with the Young Alumni Council is that we have the chance to highlight the work of outstanding alumni. The council chooses the recipient of the Outstanding Young Alumni Award, which is presented at the annual awards breakfast during Homecoming Weekend.

The Young Alumni Council serves many purposes, but its most meaningful one is to help recent alumni maintain ties with Furman. The Young Alumni Council is the perfect starting point for them to continue their commitment to Furman, and it often serves as the gateway to a lifetime of active service to alma mater.
